Phyllis Schlafly – "The Fraud of the Equal Rights Amendment" (1972)

- 1. Why does Schalfly believe that the Equal rights Amendment will actually harm women?
- 2. Schlafly's argument is different from many women of this era, considering the growth of the women's movement and NOW. How can there be such drastically different viewpoints?
- 3. (Historical Thinking Skill) Provide a counterargument to Schalfly's assertion about the status of women in the United States.

James Watt – "Environmentalists: A Threat to the Ecology of the West" (1978)

- 1. What does Watt see as the hidden motive of environmentalist movement?
- 2. How does he argue that environmentalism actually threatens the natural environment in the West?
- 3. (Historical Thinking Skill) Relate Watt's argument to Teddy Roosevelt's view and subsequent acts regarding the environment from the early 1900s.

Jerry Falwell – "Listen America" (1980)

- 1. What does Falwell see as the major threats to moral standards in 1970s America?
- 2. How does Falwell appear to understand the idea of freedom?
- 3. (Historical Thinking Skill) Explain the degree of continuity or change regarding religion in United States history going back to the colonial period.

Ronald Reagan – "Inaugural Address" (1981)

- 1. What is Reagan's definition of freedom?
- 2. What does Regan man when he says, "government is not the solution to our problem, government is the problem"?
- 3. (Historical Thinking Skill) Contrast Ronald Reagan's view of government to Franklin Roosevelt's or Lyndon Johnson's
